Large Event

Achieving and exceeding compliance with CA SB 1383



What is SB 1383?

SB 1383 is a California state mandate to reduce organic waste destined for landfills by 75%, and to recover 20% of edible food that would otherwise be sent to landfills by 2025.



Large Event

In accordance with SB 1383, your establishment qualifies as a Tier 2 Edible Food Generator under the large event definition:

An event that charges an admission price or is operated by a local agency, and serves an average of more than 2,000 individuals per day of operation.

Examples of Definition

Large events include, but are not limited to:

- Sporting Event
- Flea Market or Festival
- Public, non-profit, or privately owned park
- Parking Lot
- Golf Course
- Street System
- Open Space used for an Event
- Large Farmer's Markets
- Music Concerts

SB 1383 Requirements

As a large event that is classified as a Tier 2 Edible Food Generator, you must recover the maximum amount of edible surplus food at your establishment by fulfilling the requirements below by January 1, 2024:

- 1 Secure written agreements or contracts with food recovery organizations or services that receives your food donation. Contract must be maintained at business for compliance inspections.
- 2 Implement and participate in an edible food donation program.
- 3 For each food recovery organization or service you donate to, maintain a record of the following:

- Types of edible food donated
- Frequency of edible food donations
- Pounds of food donated per month

All records should be maintained at the business location and available to be shared with City or County staff during annual compliance inspections.



Key Dates

January 1, 2024

Tier 2 generators must be compliant with SB 1383 requirements or be subject to additional action resulting in fines and penalties.



Tips for Donation



Recovering Edible Food

A large event operator that allows food to be provided must require food facilities operating at the large event to donate excess edible food generated on site.



Keep Food off the Floor

It is important to prioritize food safety at all times by keeping food at least six inches above the floor. Ensure all food, for donation or not, is on shelves, carts, or prep tables.



Mobile Food Facilities

Ensure that all mobile food facilities are following the California Health and Safety Code when donating excess edible food.



Donor Liability Protection

Your establishment is protected by the **Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Food Donation Act** and the **California Good Samaritan Food Donation Act**, which provides liability protections for entities that make good faith donations of surplus edible food.



Annual Inspections

City or County of Ventura staff will inspect your establishment annually to verify edible food recovery arrangements have been established as required by state law SB 1383.

What to Expect

Upon arrival of City or County staff, please be able to show:

1. A copy of contracts or written agreements with each food recovery organization or service your establishment donates excess edible food to.
2. For each food recovery organization or service that your establishment has a contract or written agreement with, provide a record of:
 - The name, address, and contact information of the service or organization
 - The types of food that will be collected by or self-hauled to the service or organization
 - The established frequency that food will be collected or self-hauled
 - The quantity of food collected or self-hauled to a service or organization for food recovery measured in pounds recovered per month
